INTRODUCTION

The quarter was characterized by a severe drought which caused acute shortage of water and food in Sololo Sub County. The program had intervention for drought relief food and water tanks from Sign of hope. Water trucking was done by our beneficiaries had containers for storing water the county government. OVC sololo project activities went on well despite the drought.

The program supported 300 OVC where children reside in obbitu children home. 13 new families were enrolled into the program bringing the total households in the program to 92 households.

1. OBBITU CHILDREN HOME

Obbitu children provided residential care fir 24 children; these were 12 girls and 12 boys. The children access adequate basic needs. They have grown and developed both physical and mentally

1.1. CHILDREN HOUSES

The 3 children houses were in good state of repair, the house were regularly cleaned and washed weekly. There were still bat menaces reported in the children house. There were no any major cracks on the floor or walls were noted. The kitchen and washrooms were grass thatches.

1.2. FOOD AND NUTRITION



Obbitu children had adequate food, well balanced and in different varieties. There was no any form of shortage reported during the period under review. Foods served for the children included rice, githeri, beans, meat camel milk, chapatis, ughali, tea, vegetables and occasional fruits. Food rationed according to time table to avoid monotony and

increase good, test, appetite.

1.3. HEALTH CARE

The children were most time healthy and no major disease or symptoms reported during the quarter. Chanasa case was well managed with strict adherence to treatment and time. His health has consistently improved. Paul also conducted weekly monitoring. Obbitu dispensary was well stocked with essential drugs both our children are workers were able to be attended for minor complains. This has reduced work hour lost or reduced school absenteeism

1.4. EDUCATION



19 children attended primary school, 4 children attend nursery school, it was only Chanasa who was left in Obbitu children home. Children were average in performance but 2 of them, Guyatu and Diramu were among the top 3 in their class. 5 of the girls will complete class 8 and in 2020 proceed to secondary school. School learning materials

were issued or replaced as individual need arises. Children were able to borrow and read the library books. It has improved their confidence in trying to speak English. 75% of the children have ready about 20 books each. School bags and shoes were provided



Ruqia and dansa both in Secondary school visited Obbitu while on November - December holidays.

1.5. CLOTHNG



Obbitu children had adequate home clothes they were provided and replaced according to individual needs. Children have grown bigger and clothing them with youthful age fashion clothes was very expensive. 1 child could wear clothes worthy 2800 for boys and 3500 for girls. Each child had 2 pairs of shoes. Obbitu children provided with metal boxes for storing clothes

1.6. CARE AND PROTECTION



The children were cared for with tender care of love and provision of basic needs. Children were counseled together to behave well and incase of misbehavior in omission children were taken through acceptance of their wrong actions or complain amongst their peers. We had challenges of negative adolescence behavior especially from the

bigger girls. They refused to take responsibility and roles in the home chores..

There was ganging against the mother care takers but each cases was solved

through dialogue with the girls or individual child. There were no abuses or beating of children.

1.7. ENTERTAINMENT

Music was the main entertainment for the children over weekend where they sing and dance. The younger once could play at the playground. They also play football but get punctured by thorns very often, now they play ball made from old socks. Children were very active and also run all over the compound

1.8. WATER



The drought was very severe and we exhausted all our water tanks and survived on water boozer. Children had 4 trips of water boozer and also 4 trips of water boozer for the guest house. Children were able to get water for bathing, washing clothes and cleaning the floors of residential houses. We were able to maintain high

hygienic standards among all the children and the adults. There was no any case of disease outbreak reported.

1.9. MAINTENANCE ACTIVTIES

Minor maintenance was done by Borte, no activity was done on major or extra ordinary repairs and maintenance.

2.0. ELETRICITY

The main generator is not function, the solar power in the children houses and fathers house is not working. Only the power in the Abdi's office and workshop is properly working. In the evening the compound is very dark due to lack of security lights. In the children house were installed small 3 bulb solar panels with battery

3.0. COMPOUND

The compound was very bare, vegetation cover was completely finished due to drought. The trees shaded it leaves and were dry. There compound was clean with weekly general cleaning by children who collect waste papers, metal waste, containers, debris, animal dungs and dispose them in the refuse pit aftr which was burnt as final disposl method

4.0. ANIMALS

Obbitu children have 13 cows, due to lack of pasture their body back poor, and we bought hay for them and managed to sustain them through the drought. We have 4 donkeys 2 cows have young ones they have all survived the drought and doing well now

the activities in the green houses. 2 trips of water boozer was poured into the tanks this ustained the irrigation of 1 greenhouse with Sukuma wiki. The fruit like pawpaw survived and ocassionally children were bale to eat pawpaw.

The drought affected the rain the water in the pans were all used up and finished, this reduced

the kicthen of children.

Pan 2 had holes in its damliner on the floor and also detouched it self frrom the joint and flap on the wall near the inlet due to deposition of sand. The sand heaped and caused tension to pull apart the flap og the liner. Plan to repair and replace the liner with anew cover was underway,

2.0. HOME BASED CARE PROGRAM

2.1. HBC FOOD DISTRIBUTION

Food distribution plan to address the nutritional needs of OVC families registered, 94 households continued receiving foods. Various, foods distributed included maize, beans, cooking oil, sugar, tea leaves, and bar soap for hygiene. Food vouchers was provided for 26 households with children who were underweight and malnutrition. Families under this program were well improved and the services was stopped as to the end of September

2.2. HEALTH AND NUTRITIONAL ASSESSMENT:

Nutritional assessment was done on monthly basis for targeted children. It entails measuring weight, MUAC, and doing Z-score the height for weight.

The underweight were high, these may be contributed due to the prevailing drought, care givers being away for long time in search of water. Also some genetic factor may have contributed o under weight

2.4. OVC MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE MEETING

The OVC management committee meets once every quarter; the meeting was conducted on 27/10/2019. Various activities accomplished were shared which included

- 1. School uniforms to 50 students this are provided as per the need noted
- 2. Home clothes provided for 159 children
- 3. school stationeries provided to 177 children on quarterly basis
- 4. House hold items Kit Kaza provided for 15 families
- 5. Repair of houses done for 3 families
- 6. Built 2 new houses for families
- 7. Number of latrines constructed were 7
- 8. Cement provided for repair 26
- 9. Solar kits for class 8 were 2
- 10. Heavy duty mattresses 6 inches provided to 30 families
- 11. Water containers provided for 127 families
- 12. Reward scheme fees paid for 5 students for motivation
- 13. Secondary school fees paid to 22 students

The committee was very appreciative and commended the project for touching the lives of most vulnerable families in Sololo Sub County.

Exit of class 8 children from obbitu was also approved and further 9 HBC families were approved for exit

2.5. GOK COORDINATION AND MONITORING

The relationship of obbitu children home and GOK authorities was very cordial. We shared our OVC children admitted to Obbitu children home for their monitoring and reporting

2.6. BEEKEEPING PROJECT

5 beehives have colonies in them. We harvested 800g of honey and sold for 800 kshs. Due to drought honey production was very low, I hope with the rains expected flowers and nectars for bees to make honey. The bee catcher box in Wayegoda received colonies and we managed to transfer to our beehives.
